About the presenter:

Victor V. Bobetsky is an Associate Professor of Music at Hunter College where he directs the Teacher Education Program in Music. Dr. Bobetsky began his career in education as a choral music teacher in the New York City Public Schools, where his choirs won grants from community arts organizations to perform at local colleges and universities. He went on to serve as a school district music administrator and supervisor for over twelve years.

Dr. Bobetsky recently presented a symposium at Hunter College (May 1, 2013) exploring the origins of the song, "We Shall Overcome". Students from the New York City Public Schools and the Nubian Conservatory of Music performed several songs considered to be antecedent songs to the "We Shall Overcome" we know today. The symposium brought together students and scholars who shared a common interest in the history of "We Shall Overcome" and in the origin of related hymns and protest songs. Dr. Bobetsky's research in these areas has led to the publication of his article in the February 2014 issue of *Choral Journal* titled, "The Complex Ancestry of We Shall Overcome", in the February 2014 issue of *Choral Journal*.

Dr. Bobetsky also specializes in arranging folk songs of diverse cultures for elementary, middle and high school choruses; these arrangements are published by Boosey and Hawkes, Cambiata Press, GIA Publications, Hinshaw Music and Musica Russica. His book, *The Magic of Middle School Musicals: Inspire Your Students to Learn, Grow, and Succeed* is published by Rowman and Littlefield Education and copublished by the National Association for Music Education. Dr. Bobetsky is active in the New York City community as a piano teacher and as a church and temple organist.
