# NEW ENGLAND ORGAN COMPOSERS OF THE LATE 19<sup>TH</sup> CENTURY

# The "First Generation"

**Dudley Buck** (1839-1909). Studied in Germany in 1850s; organist and teacher in Hartford, Chicago, Boston, Brooklyn.

**William Horatio Clarke** (1840-1913). Organist in Boston; briefly in Toronto and Indianapolis before returning to Boston. Author and teacher.

**John Knowles Paine** (1839-1906). Pupil of Kotzschmar, studied in Germany in 1850s, organist in Boston and first chaired Music Professor at Harvard.

**Thomas P. Ryder** (1836-1887). Organist in Boston, compiler of several collections of pipe and reed organ music.

**Lucien H. Southard** (1827-1881). Studied at Trinity College and in Boston. Organist and teacher in Boston; later president of Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore.

**James C. D. Parker** (1828-1917). Studied in Germany; organist of Trinity Church and Handel & Haydn Society in Boston. Taught at New England Conservatory.

Whitney Eugene Thayer (1838-1889). Studied in Germany and with Paine; organist in Worcester and Boston. Teacher and editor of first journal for organists.

**George Elbridge Whiting** (1842-1924). Studied with Buck, and also in England and Germany. Organist in Boston and teacher at New England Conservatory.

**George Brenton Whitney** (1842-1914). Student of Paine, organist in Boston and teacher at New England Conservatory and Boston University.

# The "Second Generation"

**George Whitefield Chadwick** (1854-1931). Studied at New England Conservatory and in Germany. Organist in Boston and teacher at New England Conservatory; later its President.

**J. Frank Donahoe** (1856-1925). Pupil of Thayer and Whiting; organist of Holy Cross Cathedral. **Henry Morton Dunham** (1853-1929). Studied at New England Conservatory, organist in Boston and Brockton. Later head of organ dept. at New England Conservatory.

**H. Clarence Eddy** (1851-1937). Pupil of Buck, studied in Germany and France, organist in Chicago. America's first internationally known organ recitalist; compiler of organ anthologies.

Arthur William Foote (1853-1937). Graduate of Harvard and student of Paine; organist in Boston and teacher at New England Conservatory.

**Horatio W. Parker** (1863-1919). Studied at New England Conservatory and in Germany and England; organist in Boston, later music professor at Yale.

Harry Rowe Shelley (1858-1947). Studied at Yale College and with Buck, organist in New Haven and New York.

**Everett Ellsworth Truette** (1861-1933). Studied at New England Conservatory and in England and France. Organist and teacher in Boston and Newton; editor of a journal for organists.

# The "Third Generation"

**Charles Edward Ives** (1874-1954). Studied with Buck, Parker and Shelley. Organist in New Haven, New York and Danbury. Early organ works recently published.

**Daniel Gregory Mason** (1873-1953). Grandson of Lowell Mason, studied at Harvard and later taught at Columbia University. Wrote some preludes on Lowell Mason Hymns.

**Amy Cheney Beach** (1867-1944). A pianist, not an organist, but studied and performed in Boston. Wrote only one known organ work, near the end of her life.

Note: There were many other "third generation" composers who had studied organ and/or composition with the "second generation," but fewer of them were from (or remained in) New England.
